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

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

YOUNG DRIVER DEVELOPMENT COURSE - Nov 21

CONDUCTED AT THE RINGWOOD PARK MOTOR SPORT COMPLEX







Do you wish to become a competent driver?

This course is designed for junior drivers from the age of 12 to 18 years old. The course will consist of tutorial on car control, safety and car preparation.

Driving instruction is on a one-on-one basis, with instructors approved by the Confederation of Australian Motor Sport (CAMS). It is preferred that participants have some driving experience in sprint karts, motorkhanas, khanacross or RTA learners permit.

Pupils under 18 years of age will require a parent or guardian to sign the entry form to give permission.

- A scrutineering (safety check) will be carried out on all training vehicles 30 min before the advertised start. Please make sure your vehicle is in a road worthy and safe condition.
- · Your car can be a road registered or

unregistered vehicle, single seat competition vehicles are not allowed.

- Safety apparel required is neck to ankle cotton-based clothing with long sleeves.
 A helmet and flat thin sole shoes are preferred.
- Drivers of open top sports cars must wear gloves and goggles or a helmet with visor.
- Cars should also be equipped with a fire extinguisher, bonnet strap and seat belts in good condition.
- Entry for junior members of the MG Car Club Newcastle is Free.
- Entry for junior members of other car clubs is \$11 dollars. Why not join the MG Car Club Newcastle and gain the free entry.
- Minimum license requirement is a CAMS L1 (come and try) license at \$25 dollars.
- 12 month license will be available on the day.

MAXIMUM TORQUE AT 0 RPM

Converting "Oil Burners" to Plug In Electric Cars.

Recent motoring print and visual media coverage has brought to life names like "Tesla Roadster", "Chevrolet Volt" and every pommy's favourite "G-Whiz" and made them natural topics of discussion at any car nuts gathering and the future of the environment. Why are these vehicles such a hot topic of discussion? Can it be that Joe Average is finally starting to take notice of environmental issues and the impact of the trusty "oil burning" motor vehicle possibly dissolving any legacy we may leave for future generations? The Plug-in Electric Car Revolution has well and truly started but you don't need a "brand name" vehicle if you want to get involved, and hybrids still utilise conventional internal combustion engines combined with electric storage and motor technology. Even CAMS has recognised the need for an Electric vehicle category in some events like hillclimbs. So what if you like the car you already have, just want to make it electric powered? Well read on.....

A spike over a year ago I read a forum article illustrating the desire and process of Ian Hooper converting a conventional internal combustion engined (ICE) Mazda MX5 to a plug in electric vehicle. Whilst the donor vehicle is a small car reasonably light, the packaging of the new drivetrain and energy storage would surely be a problem, wouldnt it? Well believe it or not, after a year and many challenges the Electric MX5 is now completed and running, and available for a test drive if you live in WA.

They say don't judge a book by its cover, and of course Ian's MX5 looks just like any other MX5 like it on the road today, it would just sound differently. To quote Ian "The goal for the project is to build an electric sports car with performance exceeding its petrol origins, and a minimum of 100km range on a single charge. Plus, as a demo car for ZEVA, it must look as good as it runs!".




Obviously Ian has extensive knowledge and experience in the technology he transplanted into his MX5, however, this project is not dissimilar to someone putting a Honda S2000 engine in a Datsun 1600 for example - there are key legal, safety and engineering aspects that need to be considered and addressed either prior to the project commencing or working through the issues as the project progresses. Through CAD modelling, component mockup/prototyping and good old "trial and error" Ian has been able to overcome all the hurdles thrown at him to complete his project car. Like the retention of a heater/demister and vacuum assisted braking, vehicle manoeuvrability and reversing, drivetrain failures, packaging all the components of the new powerplant within the existing vehicle structure, rewiring most of the vehicle and of course the inevitable fabrication of engine mounts and other component brackets for all the new hardware.

For anyone that has restored a car back to original, performed an engine transplant

(across manufacturers) or built a dedicated race car, you can relate to massive task that Ian has taken on and completed. The more and more I look at his blog and pictures, the more impressive his creation becomes. The attention to detail, design and quality of the fabricated components and the end result are spectacular and better than a lot of ICE and drivetrain transplants I have seen.

Currently one of the most inhibitive factors for converting ICE to electric is cost of components - this conversion cost aprroximatelt \$25K, however, like all things as technology changes and demand rises the cost of components will reduce and the components available will be smarter and more developed.

If you would like to read more about Ian's creation have a look at www.zeva.com.au and also www.evworks.com.au - there is also a vast array of resources to give you a better understanding of converting ICE to electric - it is more complicated than you think - dont forget to visit the Physics Theory section at EVWorks and keep checking back as technology is developing very rapidly.

Thanks to Ian Hooper for his vision and determination for developing this car and rest assured, when I am next in WA I will be knocking on you door fo a test drive.

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

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

The planning group has held 3 meetings so far this year. Our next 2011 Planning Meeting is being held at the Club rooms at 7.30pm on Tuesday 27th October.

Changes to National Meeting configuration

- * There seems to be 2 distinct and opposite views about this topic;
 - that Nat meets should get back to competition and limit the social costs
 - that Nat meets should become less competition focus and up the social activities
- * The presentation night could be a barbeque I'm not cooking a Barbie for 500 people.
- * BYO food at the Noggin n natter. (I guess that depends on the venue. I can't see Panthers Newcastle being overly keen on that idea!)

It has been suggested that some clubs struggle to entertain the idea of hosting a Nat Meet because they don't have access to speed event or motorkhana venues — which led to the suggestion to have a Concourse & 2 rallies! It has been suggested that this become a set thing every 2 years, or being an option for small clubs to consider if a larger club doesn't nominate to host a traditional type event. I haven't actually heard a lot from these "small" clubs re what their thinking is.

And then there is the daddy of them all and my personal favourite (not) that a super committee be formed to run National Meetings as a business. I couldn't think of anything worse. One of things that I find appealing about the Nat Meets is the individual character that each host club brings to the nat meet scene. Hi all. Well I've never written a magazine article before and who knows this could be the first and last time, hence the title of this article covers a few subjects.

When Mal (Roach) & I first joined the MGCC several years ago I competed in quite a few events and even though I did not do especially well at anything in particular I really did enjoy myself. I think my personal highlight would be a khanacross at Ringwood. It had not rained for months and even during the reconnaissance of the circuit you could not see more than 2 meters in front of you for all the dust. It got in your eyes, ears, nose, mouth, clothes, everywhere and that was with all the car windows shut. The outside temperature was about 40 degrees so it was like a little tin sweat box inside the car. Phil Horn had given me a few pointers whilst practising my skills (or lack of them) driving around his paddock at Cliftleigh. I loved it when he gave me a ride in the passenger seat. Weeeeee. What fun! Back to Ringwood and I've never laughed so much going over the very rough and rocky (felt like boulders) ground at the slowest pace of the day and I still managed to get lost but somehow no one noticed! They lost me in the dust.

Along came Kari our daughter who was born on 25/4/04. Mal opted to attend a Hillclimb at Ringwood whilst I was in labour but one telephone call from me screaming my head off got him moving FAST to the John Hunter Hospital. The juggle of sharing a car and baby with Mal was now on. I was so proud of myself when I won the Ladies Championship in 2005. Not from winning any competitions but just from turning up and giving it a go. We mainly raced in a Formula Vee borrowed from Phil Horn. It was old but had grunt. I felt like I was going a million miles an hour sitting that close to the ground. Mal was also very encouraging during this time.

Time passed and Mal started to compete at Wakefield Park, Oran Park and Eastern Creek with his recently restored 1974 Ford Escort Mark 1(2 door). Kari calls this car "the noisy blue car with stickers". I have been in several Supersprints at Wakefield Park and have enjoyed them immensely. I highly recommend this track to all the ladies out there who want to give racing a go as it is a very non threatening circuit and competing is taken as seriously as YOU want it to be.



Since then Mal has had the Escort revamped again and to date he has not let me drive it. Boohoo. My last drive was in September 2007. We really have not seen much of Mal since then.

It's been a while since Kari and I have attended any car related events. Mal's main excuse for us not attending is it is too expensive to take us along. Mal competes, officiates or is playing with one car or another on most weekends so you could say he is a little obsessed by car racing. If he is not at a meeting for the MGCC he can usually be found in his office talking on the telephone to one of the MGCC members about a car/race/event matter. This is how I usually find out what is happening in the MGCC world.

On the weekend of 24/25th June Mal invited me and Kari to Oran Park for the weekend to watch the HSRCA weekend races. I think the one common theme of the event was that everyone was there to have fun and get the most out of their car. I'm not a fan of modern day race cars. The V8 Supercars do nothing for me. There were a few good tussles during the day especially one between a green car and a black car.

I was impressed by the silver car which made me think of how racing must have been years ago. And risky. Apparently seatbelts and helmets were not compulsory for many years. Oran Park is a great circuit for spectators as you can see most of the track from many vantage points. Kari and I walked around 90% of the track taking photos. I especially liked it when a Porsche went wide at the sweep and ran along the concrete barrier. The noise sent a shiver up my spine. Mal spent most of his time in the pits with John Tarrant. Kari and I were fortunate to come across a fully restored 1976 Van Dieman. It was good to see what Mal's car would eventually look like.





It was good to be "on the edge" of the circuit but I must admit it made me want to get in the drivers seat again. I love that nervous excitement sitting in the pits waiting to go on the track. The fear and speed is the attraction for me and I was always amazed how I had no spit left in my mouth when I came back into the pits after a supersprint because of how hard I was breathing. My heart rate was through the roof.

I'm looking forward to the new track being built at Ringwood. I've heard so much about it through ease dropping in on Mal's telephone conversations. I think it will be a benefit to our club and motor sport in the Hunter in general. So maybe when the track is built you will find me "on the edge" but with excitement from being back behind the wheel and not just dreaming from behind the barriers.............



LAND PANEL REPORT

The work achieved at Ringwood recently includes finishing the retaining wall behind the canteen, which finishes the terracing down to the edge of the track, giving us levelled areas over the 6 foot fall in the terrain. Steps have been provided for easy access to the top levels. Our next project is to erect an awning over the levelled area behind the canteen.

Usual jobs of mowing and back filling took place as well as the Armco pressure cleaned with some sections painted as well as the ripple strips. All this took place prior to our round of the hillclimb championships.

On the day a problem arose with our main water tank at the toilet block being empty and a pump was acquired to pump water from our reserve tank. We are investigating the reason why the tank was empty, as a fortnight earlier it was overflowing. The tanks have now been joined so we now have no need for a pump.

Work has been progressing of the joining of the two lower Motorkhana areas with 2 large stumps being removed with back filling and extensive clearing of undergrowth. Now we need to get committee to OK purchase of 80m of 600mm pipes to lay in the drain so we can back fill and level to join both areas, which would give us an area of approx. 150m x 100m.

Some work has been carried out on our rally sprint track, with the event being postponed to December, because of the previous rain. As well some stumps have been removed and corners reshaped, this does not include the tremendous amount of work put in by Bill Pearson on both the tracks and spectator points. Work had also been going ahead on preparation for the Motorkhana and Twighlight Hillclimb which was part of the successful Motor Games weekend, with quite a number of juniors competing made it well worthwhile the effort in the preparations.

Our boundary re-alignment is at present with the Pt. Stephens Council, and the last survey is a Bushfire assessment. A decision should be made in the near future, (Gee don't things move quickly). Also IRH has deposited 10 tonnes of fill into a washed away area to gain access to the side of the property.

On the equipment side of things, preparing the rally sprint tracks has taken its toll on our machinery, with the cutting blade on the front bucket of the backhoe being replaced by Club member Lindsay Chaff which saved the club a considerable amount of money. Our full appreciation goes to Lindsay. The damage of course was done by loading gravel from the quarry. Also a hydraulic hose blew out whilst removing a stump on the rally sprint track, the backhoe will never rust out and my oil soaked jeans are in the wiz bin.

A seal in the ram on the tractor gave up during preparations of the Motorkhana area and the ram needed rebuilding. Our large generator motor is now key started, but is not generating. This is being looked at and appears to be the control panel. At this time I would like to thank on behalf of the club those members who have assisted in developing and maintaining our property.

Lyall Clarke, Bill Pearson, Lindsay Chaff, Eric Chandler, Gregor Dickinson, Mike Cole, Ken Short, Michael Snow, Bryn Baverstock, Jim Bayliss, Kevin Edwards, Allan Bates, Kenneth Atkins, Glenn Parsonage, Jim Gardiner, Andy Peters, to name a few, and many more who have helped clear prepare and maintain the complex at Ringwood Park.

COMMITTEE POSITIONS

PRESIDENT

The leader, chairs committee meetings, and has the casting vote in case of a deadlock decision. Delegates jobs to committee persons, encourages members at events, and always acts with the best interests of the Club and its members.

VICE PRESIDENT

Assists the President, stands in for him/her when the President is absent. Helps other committee members with any special projects.

SECRETARY

Takes the minutes, deals with the incoming and outgoing correspondence, circulates information to members, via the magazine, passes on information to the various panels. Answers inquiries about the club and its activities. Is in touch with CAMS.

TREASURER

Handles the Club's accounts receives the money, deals with banking and investments. Is responsible for paying the accounts, keeping records, and making sure that the books are audited at the end of the financial year.

CLUB CAPTAIN

Organises the Club Championship Structure and maintains the Club member pointscore, as well as the calendar. Receives results and working bee records for the pointscore. Co-ordinates with panels to organises trophies after the events for distribution.

EVENT CO-ORDINATOR

Is an important part of setting up the years calendar along with the Club Captain to construct the Club Championship pointscore. Helps other panel members to promote their events. Is responsible for maintaining current list of calendar with event changes that often happen and supply to Editor a list of coming events for the current magazine. Ideally a NAMS delegate as well.

REGISTER CAPTAIN

An MG owner - someone who is likely to attend most of the Club Runs. Organises the monthly Register Runs also the annual Concours. Keeps the register pointscore for MG owners, contacts MG members for promotional parades or displays.

REGISTER SECRETARY

Assists the Register Captain to plan and conduct MG events. Ensures inquires and correspondence specifically relating to MG's are considered and answered. May act as National Meeting Co-ordinator organising accommodation and travel arrangements. Looks after the Club's Vintage Plate Registration Scheme. Keeps abreast of MG information in Australia and overseas.

SOCIAL SECRETARY

Provides supper for Club Nights each month (does not have to cook) can be purchased. Organise other social outings as well as Christmas/Presentation Dinner and Natter Nights. Can form a social committee of helpers if necessary. Help with catering at events if required.

EDITOR

DOES NOT WRITE THE MAGAZINE, but receives articles written by others to edit and produce the magazine. Ensures the magazine is delivered to and from the printer. Organises the Magazine Assemblies and posting .Handles gathering of advertisers, artwork and invoices.

MEMBERSHIP SECRETARY

Processes new members and keeps a database of club members up to date. Ensures new members receive relevant information on joining

PUBLICITY OFFICER

Inform members and the general public of our activities. Always striving to keep a high profile of the Club whenever possible. Extra promotion for large events such as State Hillclimb events at Ringwood, King Edward Park etc. Endevour to get Club information into newspapers, radios or magazines. May assist the Register Captain with displays and parades, and the Editor with advertisers for the magazine.

SPEED EVENT CO-ORDINATOR

Organises Tar Speed events such as Ringwood Hillclimbs, Supersprints etc. This persons does not have to Direct all these events, but is responsible for making them happen and can assist Make sure event permits from CAMS are in place and supp regs are distributed to invited clubs. Make sure enough officials are organised and the venue is ready. Results to go to the Club Captain. Might keep mailing list of competitors.

MOTORKHANA C0-0RDINATOR

Organises the Motorkhana/ Khanacross events for the year. Locate suitable venues. Once again does not have to organise all events, but responsible to organise officials, timekeepers, paperwork to CAMS etc. Send results to Club Captain.

RALLY PANEL

Organise Rallies/ Rallysprints/ Touring Road Events for the year. Can use other Directors, organise checkers, officials, liase with local authorities, Police, Foresty etc. paperwork to CAMS. Bring rally matters to committee for attention.

LAND PANEL

Is responsible for the maintenance of the Track and surrounding area at Ringwood. Organises any work to be done by other parties or organises and advertises working bees of club members for general maintenance of the Complex. Works closely with the Speed Event and Equipment maintenance Co-ordinators

EQUIPMENT MAINTENANCE

Responsible for the maintenance of mechanical equipment at Ringwood Complex. DOES NOT HAVE TO FIX IT PERSONALLY, organises necessary work to be done by others, so that equipment is fully functionally. Makes recommendations to Committee re equipment needed.

COMMITTEE NO.1

This person has no direct responsibilities, helps other committee members with projects., may have previously been on Committee.

COMMITTEE NO.2

Must be first appointment to the Committee, assists other committee members. Is a good introduction to the running of the Club and its business and activities.
